They took the concept of democracy beyond anything seen before. Unlike other revolutions to follow, their work endured the test of history. ... Somehow this group of men was able to integrate classical learning and modern concepts of philosophy with their own spiritual convictions and common sense. These were all religious men and conscious of the role of religion in supporting the moral fiber of the nation. God used this amazing talent to somehow blend the crosscurrents of the Great Awakening and the Enlightenment into a new civil and religious order unseen before in history."







## July 18, 1755 letter to his brother, John A. Washington:


"As I have heard; since my arrival at this place, a circumstantial account of my death and dying speech; I take this early opportunity of contradicting the firs, and of assuring you, that I have not, as yet, composed the latter. – But by the all-powerful dispensations of Providence, I have been protected beyond all human probability or expectation; for I had four bullets through my coat, and two horses shot under me, yet escaped unhurt, although death was leveling my companions on every side of me."




Sept 7, 1777, Capt. Patrick Ferguson & 3 of his men saw to American commanders riding in the distance near Brandywine River.


"It was not pleasant to fire at the back of an unoffending individual who was acquitting himself coolly of his duty, and so I let him alone."











Mar 4, 1776 at 7:00 pm, American forces began working and through the night positioned all of the cannons.

At 10:00 pm, Gen Smith, received a report that the Americans were working up on Dorchester Heights, but ignored it and did nothing.











## Gen Howe declared:





















Gen. George Washington to Gen. Thomas Nelson, Jr., Aug 20, 1778

"The hand of Providence has been so conspicuous in all this, that he must be worse than an infidel that lacks faith, and more than wicked, that has not gratitude enough to acknowledge his obligations – but – it will be time enough for me to turn preacher, when my present appointment ceases; and therefore, I shall add no more on the Doctrine of Providence; ..."

"Miracles do not often occur in military and naval operations, but Yorktown was a miracle. At a time when the American cause was disintegrating, it brought victory. At a time when the British could not effectively coordinate two armies in the colonies ... it was an example of perfect coordination of a fleet with the armies of two different nations. At a time when communications were slow and unreliable. it demonstrated precise timing on the part of forces 1,500 miles apart."
