•	The Old Testament contains prophesies regarding the Messiah, most of which were fulfilled by the first coming of Jesus Christ. Even the most liberal critics acknowledge that these prophesies were written at least years before Christ.			
•	The Bible contains over fulfilled prophesies, most with very specific details.
