
Florence Littauer: "When Michelangelo was ready to carve the statue of David, he spent a long time in selecting the marble, for he knew the quality of the raw material would determine the beauty of the finished product. He knew he could change the shape of the stone, but he couldn't transform the basic ingredient.

Every masterpiece he made was unique, for even if he had wanted to, he would not have been able to find a duplicate piece of marble. Even if he cut a block from the same quarry, it wouldn't have been exactly the same. Similar, yes, but not the same.





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
Personality: the unique patterns of thoughts, feelings, and behaviors that distinguish a person from others.








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

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3. Choleric: an extrovert, a doer, an optimist


Are best:


